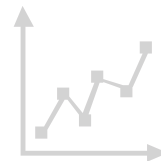

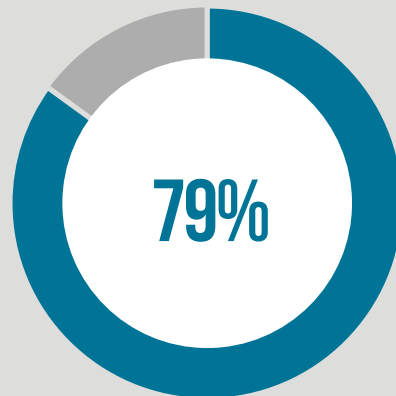
An overwhelming majority of voters believe the salaries teachers receive in Arizona is too low.
